STANFORD IN THE VALE WASTE RECYCLING CENTRE COULD CLOSE?



Oxfordshire County Council are reviewing their waste recycling centre strategy.

The County Council has launched a public consultation on plans to save £350,000 by 2017/18 by reducing the number of Household Waste and Recycling Centres and their opening times.

The Centre's, which receive more than a million visits annually, are currently located at Alkerton, Ardley, Stanton Harcourt, Drayton, Oakley Wood, Redbridge, and Stanford in the Vale. It has already been announced that Ardley will close by 2017.

The County Council is proposing to reduce the number of Centres from seven down to three or four, and change their opening hours.

The new sites would be located in:

- central Oxfordshire expanding or replacing Redbridge
- central South Oxfordshire expanding or replacing Drayton
- central North Oxfordshire replacing Ardley and Alkerton with a new site

A fourth site could be located at Dix Pit, Oakley Wood or Stanford in the Vale, or at a brand new location.

David Roberts, Chairman of the Parish Council comments "The Stanford in the Vale site is once again under threat. Your Parish Council will give consideration to the proposals and all residents, whatever their views, are encouraged to respond to the consultation document."

SUNDAY TRADING HOURS COULD CHANGE

In response to changing shopping habits the Government has put forward proposals to devolve Sunday trading laws to allow greater flexibility over the hours that large shops can stay open.

This September South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Councils will submit a joint response to the proposals, however before doing so we want to hear how residents and local businesses may be affected if these changes go ahead.

Under current arrangements large shops with more than 280 square metres floor space can only open for up to six hours between 10am and 6pm on a Sunday, while smaller premises are free to open all day.

The Government hopes that by allowing local flexibility for Sunday trading, consumers will be offered more choice when to shop locally, businesses will have more freedom on opening hours and staff greater opportunity to work on a Sunday.

This information will help us to understand the impact of the public consultation proposals and determine what type of support communities may need if the proposals are implemented.

Why are we making changes?

The council needs to save more than £6 million on supported transport. We can save money by running services more efficiently, but savings also have to come from reducing the community subsidies and Dial-a-Ride service. Oxfordshire County Council subsidies over 100 bus services in our county, which makes up around 9% of the bus network, so the proposals in the subsidised bus and Dial-a-Ride consultation may affect one in ten bus users and all Dial-a-Ride users. 

Hello from Reverend Talisker

I am delighted to be coming to Cherbury with Gainfield as your new Rector. As I write this, our moving date is getting closer and we are surrounded by a house full of boxes and a pair of very confused cats.

Jim and I are very excited about moving to the Vale of the White Horse. We love walking and being in nature and we are looking forward to exploring the Ridgeway and the beautiful countryside around Charney Bassett.

My spiritual journey has taken me in various interesting directions, from St Andrews in Scotland for university, to teaching Classics at Christ's Hospital near Horsham, to Cuddesdon in Oxford where I trained for ministry. My time in "Sussex by the sea" has been a time of unexpected and joyful discovery where I not only acquired a husband - who is a Quaker and committed Christian - but I also had the pleasure of working for four years within a vibrant community in a traditional church setting, ministering to a wide variety of people from diverse backgrounds and places, where our church is welcoming of everyone of all ages and backgrounds.

Unconditional welcome lies at the heart of my ministry and I believe is the essence of what Jesus was showing us. In preparing for our move, Jim and I recently came across an art print, for our new home, by the American artist John August Swanson. The print is a series of images telling the story of the Prodigal Son, and the central image is the welcome which the father gives his son on his return home. We loved this print because it tells the whole story in such vibrant colour through a series of images, of the son leaving home, the highs and lows of life, and that realization that however we have chosen to live our lives and wherever we have been on our journey, that ultimately unconditional love and welcome await us in the heart of God. For me, the church is a place where everyone is welcomed and where they can come to find space and peace if they wish, and I very much hope that you will feel able to do this throughout my ministry at Charney and across the benefice.

The welcome which Jim and I have received on our visits since I was appointed has been incredibly warm. We are both country people - I was raised in South Cerney and Pangbourne, and Jim grew up on Shugborough estate in Staffordshire, so we look forward to returning to our rural roots. We both look forward very much to saying hello to everyone in Charney over the coming months. Several years ago I enjoyed a wonderful New Year retreat at Charney Manor and I now look forward to settling into the community on a permanent basis, and to ministering amongst you all for many years to come.


