### **RURAL CRIME UPDATE FROM ASSISTANT CHIEF CONSTABLE NIKKI ROSS**

Reports of rural crime in the Thames Valley have increased by five percent between October 2016 and September 2017.

I would like to reassure members of our rural communities of my commitment to investigating reports of rural crime. We rely on information from our local communities and take such reports very seriously. Incidents are robustly investigated by our local policing teams who have dedicated Rural Crime and Wildlife Officers based across the Thames Valley.

Rural crime can take many different forms including burglary, robbery, theft, criminal damage, fly tipping, poaching and hare coursing. We are continuing to work with local residents, businesses and partners to raise awareness of crime prevention techniques while developing problem solving solutions to tackle rural crime.

There are often fewer witnesses to rural crimes and greater opportunities for criminals to target isolated properties and businesses. The impact of these crimes can also be greater, with people feeling more vulnerable due to their remote location.

You can reduce the risk of becoming a victim of rural crime by taking a few simple steps including:

- Keeping the boundaries of your land and property well-maintained and secure
- Fitting strong locks to sheds, garages and outbuildings
- Checking security equipment regularly to ensure it is working properly
- Locking equipment away in a secure building when it's not in use
- Security marking your tools and equipment

### **HISTORY WEBSITE NEWS**

### ARCHEOLOGICAL DIG FINDS IDENTIFICATION:

Despite the snow, 15 people came on Sunday 10th December afternoon to help with the sorting, recording and identification of the finds from the Archaeological Dig.

We achieved this in a little under 2 hours and David Ashby (our guiding Archaeologist) gave a short summary of what we had found and indeed not found. When asked if anything came up that was surprising, David said possibly the one or two Roman, Saxon and prehistoric finds which could be interpreted as an indication of occupation at Charney for a very long time. Also when asked about the lack of pre-medieval finds on the Village Green, surprising because it was a supposed marketplace he said this may indicate that the location of the village may have moved around more than was thought, and cited the separation between Charney Bassett now and Charney Wick (located in the fields to the east).

### ST PETER'S GRAVEYARD PLAN:

One of the recent big History Group projects came to a conclusion this month. Joe Ody had, some years ago, created a plan of the graveyard and together with Mike Newman decided to enhance and digitise the information so that it can be searched. With Iain McGregor's help this complex and time consuming work has now been completed and can be seen at

Joe and Iain will now be able to more easily help the quite numerous people who visit the churchyard searching for the graves of their family. When Revd. Talisker had a look she was very impressed, sent huge thanks for the Village's continued support of the Church and even asked for the plan to be enhanced even further to become a working document for the Church. Onwards and upwards!
